Dear Department,

A member of Chancery recently had a conversation with a thoroughly disgruntled woman taxi-driver which tends to show what some Soviet citizens feel about the impression given to visiting delegations that "all's for the best in the best possible Soviet world".

2. The taxi-driver opened the conversation by asking her fare whether there was really widespread unemployment and starvation in England. When she received an anused denial she burst into a long description of what life was really like for the poor in the Soviet Union "whetever lies you are told on the radio and in the press when you come to our poor country".

3. According to her, criticism was only theoretically good. She herself had been stupid enough recently at a works meeting to criticise the way the plan was being carried out. As a result she was laid off work for 2 months without any financial help and only taken on again after despairing appeals to the <u>Raikom</u> and a promise never to criticise again. Her husband, a skilled metal-worker before the war with a salary of 1,800 roubles (though the same worker now earned only 700 roubles) was now totally disabled but received only 160 roubles monthly as pension. They had lived in Moscow 30 years but now had 7 square metres in a damp room for herself, her husband and two children and protests and applications to the <u>Raikom</u> were no use. Last winter the gas had been cut off and now it leaked perpetually.

"Here in India, we are not less involved in the Polish Question than Britain itself; there, it is their honour that is at stake; here, it is *also* the cause of our Independence. This statement is not so paradoxical as it might sound. It is quite true that Poland and India are so far apart that if you wish to know the exact distance in miles and furlongs you have to ask a long-range crow. RUSSIA, POLAND, AND INDIA

By S. R. ALI

THERE is in the United Nations' cupboard an ugly skeleton which threatens to vitiate our moral cause, the one adequate justification for this unparalleled butchery. In these days of realism, when skeletons, like ghosts, have lost half their horror, there can be no harm in opening the cupboard to have a good look inside, especially when by so doing we provide for a much needed ventilation.

The Britain of Mr. Chamberlain declared war on Germany to honour its pledge to Poland, not has the Government of Mr. Churchill ever disowned that pledge : "I took occasion", said the Premier on February 23, 1944. 'to raise personally with Marshal Stalin the question of the future of Poland. I pointed out that it was in fulfilment of our guarantee to Poland that Britain declared war on Nazi Germany, and had never weakened in our resolve, even during the period when we were alone, and that the fate of the Polish nation holds a prime place in the thought and policies of His Majesty's Government and the British Parliament." But if the present Soviet-Polish dispute were to be solved in a sense that runs counter to that declaration, and to the words and the spirit of the Atlantic Chatter -to which Russia adhered in principle on September 27, 1941 our moral cause would rank just as low as the enemy's, and all would be lost. Honour would he lost, for it matters mighty little to trounce Nazism on the battle-field, if we suffer it to sit at the Peace Conferencecamouflaged in a red shirt and to inspire the proceedings. If that were to happen, then, Mr. Churchill's noble words; I have nothing' to offer but blood, toil, sweat and tears', would assume a meaning he could have never intended.

It is very true that the British Government has 'never in the past guaranteed.. any particular frontier line to Poland', and we think it was wise of the Premier to draw attention to that

Article 'journey'



- AO = Author's Original / Author Version / Preprint the version of the article initially submitted to the journal
- AM = Accepted Manuscript / Postprint the version of an article which has been through peer review and been accepted for publication
- VoR = Version of Record the final published version of an article, including all typesetting, copy-editing, and reference linking. Can include links to subsequent errata or retraction notices, comments, replies, supplemental data, etc.

Ethics for authors: the essentials

- 1. Be wary of **self-plagiarism**.
- 2. Don't submit a paper to more than one journal at a time.
- 3. Don't send an **incomplete paper** just to get feedback.
- **4. Always** include and / or acknowledge all co-authors (and let them know you've submitted the paper to be published).
- 5. Always mention any source of funding for your paper.
- If you are using data sets gathered by someone else, check that you have permission to use them in your article.

Allows an author's research to be evaluated and commented upon by independent experts. It can take different forms:

- **Single-blind review:** where the reviewer's name is hidden from the author.
- **Double-blind review:** where the reviewer's name is hidden from the author and the author's name is hidden from the reviewer.
- **Open review:** where no identities are concealed.
- **Post-publication review:** where comments can be made by readers and reviewers after the article has been published.

Every article published in a Taylor & Francis journal goes through rigorous peer review.

Maximising the article's impact

- **Post updates** and link to your article on academic and professional networking sites.
- Use social media to **post a link to your article** and **highlight key points**.
- Add a brief summary and link to your article on your **department website**. Then add it to your students' reading lists.
- Think your research is newsworthy? Speak to your institution's press office, provide them with a link to your article, and include them in social media posts.
- If you are a blogger or have a personal webpage write about your article and link to it. Then write about your post on social media, linking to it and the article.

UIMPACT FACTOR

The Impact Factor is the most commonly used metric to assess a journal. Different subjects have varying citation patterns, which are reflected in a journal's calculation.

Released annually based on Web of Science Journal Citation Reports*, only journals in the Science Citation Index Expanded (SCIE) and Social Sciences Citation Index (SSCI) can have an Impact Factor.

How it's calculated:

9-S-YEAR IMPACT FACTOR The 5-Year impact Factor attempts to reflect the longevity of research, and is more stable year-on-year for smaller titles as there are a langer number of articles and citations included. These are useful for subject areas where it takes longer for work to be cited.

Open access makes published academic research freely and permanently available online. Anyone, anywhere can read and build upon this research.

- Gold open access: the final published version of the article (or Version of Record) is permanently and freely available online for anyone, anywhere to read. An article publishing charge (APC) is usually applicable to publish gold OA. This includes publishing in both fully open and hybrid open access journals.
- **Green open access:** also known as self-archiving, an earlier version of the manuscript is hosted in repositories and online. This allows the author to share their article and comply with most funder mandates, without having to pay an APC.
- **Open research:** Open access is one part of this larger drive for more openness in scholarly communication. Open research, also called **'open science'** or **'open scholarship'**, looks beyond the peer-reviewed journal article or book at the other outputs of the research cycle. This can include research data, code, and lab notes.

Article Submission Submitting an article is easy with our single-page submission system. The in-house editorial team carries out a basic check on each submission to ensure that all policies are adhered to.

Publication & Data Deposition

Once the authors have finalised the manuscript, the article (with its associated source data) is published within a week, enabling immediate viewing and citation.

Open Peer Review & User Commenting

Expert reviewers are selected and invited, and their reports and names are published alongside the article, together with the authors' responses and comments from registered users.

Article Revision

Authors are encouraged to publish revised versions of their article. All versions of an article are linked and independently citable. Articles that pass peer review are indexed in external databases such as PubMed, Scopus and Google Scholar.
